Instructions for Hand Surgery

POST OPERATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. A splint or soft dressing may be placed on your hand. This dressing must be kept dry.
- 2. You may move your fingers while in the dressing or splint unless otherwise instructed.
- 3. Avoid heavy lifting and keep activities to a minimum.
- 4. Elevation of the extremity above the heart is important while the splint or dressing is intact.
- 5. Elevation helps reduce swelling and pain. Elevate your hand by using two pillows.
- 6. Use pain medication as directed. If none has been prescribed, use a non-aspirin pain reliever.
- 7. If a drain has been placed in the wound, it will usually be removed in 24-48 hours after surgery.
- 8. Sutures are usually removed in 10-14 days after surgery.
- 9. Return to work and resumption of activities will be discussed at follow-up appointments.

THINGS TO REPORT TO OUR OFFICE

- 1. Throbbing, pounding pain that is not relieved by elevation and pain medication.
- 2. Excessive bleeding that saturates dressings or fills drain tube immediately or continuously.
- 3. Temperature of 100 degrees or greater.
- 4. Nausea or vomiting.
